Cake Ingredients (using 9 x 13 inch cake pan)

1 – yellow cake mix (**dry-** do NOT add nothing to it)

1 – tsp soda

2 – eggs

1 – cup water

1/8 – tsp salt

3 - bananas (3 large **OR** 4 medium size) fork mash them

Frosting Ingredients

1 - 3.4 box of Instant Vanilla **OR** Banana Cream Pudding

1 ½ - Cup Milk

1 – 8 Oz Cool Whip

Baking instructions

Using your mixer, Mix cake ingredients above together and bake at 350 degrees in a sprayed and floured 9 x 13 in pan-follow baking time on the box. It is done when inserted toothpick comes out clean. When cooled, mix up the frosting mixture- instant vanilla pudding , 1 ½ cup milk, stir well and fold in the cool whip. Pour that over the cooled cake and refrigerate! **Enjoy!!**

September often marks a return to routines, and during the 1970s, it also signaled the start of a new television season. Long before streaming and on-demand viewing, fall TV premieres were major events. Families gathered around the television to watch the first episodes of returning favorites and discover new shows that would soon become part of everyday conversation. The 1970s are often remembered as a golden age of television sitcoms. Programs such as All in the Family, The Mary Tyler Moore Show, and Happy Days reflected changing social attitudes while providing plenty of humor. Their characters, catchphrases, and storylines became cultural touchstones, influencing entertainment for decades to come. Music was equally influential. The decade saw the rise of disco, a dance-driven style that filled clubs and radio stations. Funk also gained widespread popularity, blending powerful rhythms, bass lines, and energetic performances. Artists experimented with new sounds, helping shape modern popular music. Fashion followed suit with bold styles and colorful self-expression. 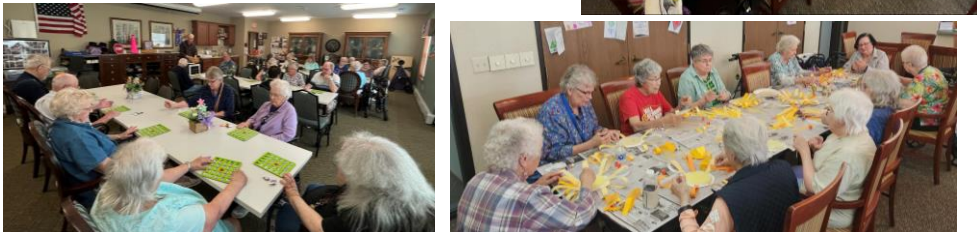
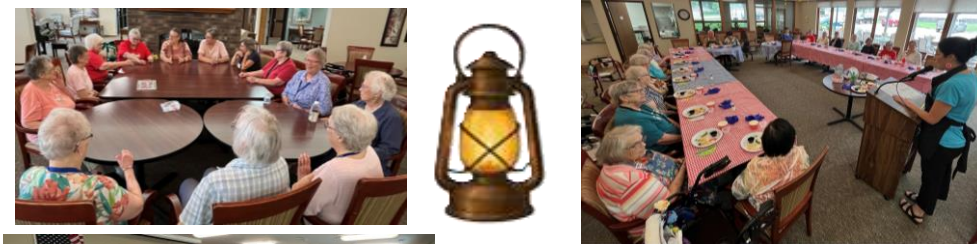
Page Turners Book Club:

Badges And Beyond

This month shines a spotlight on scouting, a movement that has introduced millions of young people to leadership, service, and the great outdoors. Scouting began in the early 1900s when British army officer Robert Baden-Powell started an organization that taught outdoor skills, teamwork, and self-reliance. The idea quickly spread around the world. Today, scouting organizations serve millions of members in more than 170 countries. Service to others has always been at the heart of scouting. Scouts regularly collect food for pantries, clean parks and trails, plant trees, and assist with community events. Many of the movement's highest honors require significant service projects. To earn the rank of Eagle Scout, for example, participants must plan and lead a community service project that benefits a school, religious institution, or nonprofit organization. Badges are another important part of the scouting experience. Merit badges and achievement patches recognize progress and encourage members to explore new interests. Topics range from camping and first aid to astronomy, engineering, and environmental science. For many scouts, badges become milestones that mark personal growth and achievement. Outdoor adventure is also a hallmark of scouting. Camping trips, hikes, canoeing expeditions, and nature studies teach practical skills while encouraging an appreciation for the natural world. Studies have found that participation in scouting can help young people develop confidence, leadership abilities, and a strong sense of civic responsibility. More than a century after its beginnings, scouting continues to inspire new generations. Whether building a campfire, earning a badge, or leading a community project, scouts discover lessons that often last a lifetime. These observances are a reminder that the values of helping others, developing skills, and exploring the outdoors remain as relevant today as ever.
